Thank you to everyone who helped to prepare the altar for the Forty hours and to those who signed up to ensure there was always someone in the church; day and night. It was wonderful to see people coming and going and spending some time with the Lord—a good thing to remind ourselves that this is a house of prayer and praise where the Lord is with us.

The monstrance used to expose the Blessed Sacrament is a silver-gilt piece made by Kunst Werkplaatsen Esser, Belgium and was presumably bought by the parish in the 1930s. The seven-branch candelabra were also in the sacristy and have recently been given a good polish.

Capturing an Eternal Moment

The Church gives two reasons for reserving the Eucharistic Bread, the Blessed Sacrament. Principally, so that Communion can be given to the sick and dying, and only secondarily so that the Sacrament can be adored. For some, what we are doing now can seem far removed from Jesus's simple sharing of himself at the table in the Upper Room. To hold the Sacrament, whole and up high, in precious metal and amid all these candles seems a travesty of his breaking and giving at that poor supper: A straight contradiction of what was commanded by the simple actions of our Saviour in the Breaking of Bread.

So what are we doing, here, in this lavish celebration of his Body and Blood—keeping his Body whole and on high, and worshipping it solemnly over forty hours? The readings give us clear instruction: we are seeking to capture a moment in time of God's eternal goodness to us in this Sacrament: A moment of God's faithful presence among us. A full and complete moment of all he has done, continues to do, and will ever do for us. We are capturing an eternal moment and like the people of the Exodus, today, we are giving answer to God's goodness in bringing us home. The cup of salvation we have raised, so as to call on the Lord's name.

There is another moment, isn't there, when the Cup and the Bread are raised whole, just before they are given: The moment at the Last Supper, that today's Gospel records and the moment of consecration in every Mass, when the Eucharist is shown to the people. We are capturing that moment in these hours to meditate on it for a while. We need to do this because it is a complete moment, full and whole—before the Bread is broken.

What is it we see in that moment? Who is it we experience? We sometimes forget it is our Lord's risen Body—whole and complete—and that we encounter our risen Saviour, whose work is all finished. Yes, continuous with the Body bloodied on the Cross but now glorious in eternity. It's this that the beautiful passage from Hebrews teaches us: That the moment we capture, today, is a moment in which all the blessings: past, present and future, are gathered up and given to us by our Eternal High Priest—Who has gone beyond the poor tabernacle we have here, to the perfect tent where all is new, full, complete.

Now is the time to hold back from the breaking for a moment, just a moment—because the breaking and giving is his purpose—to consider the whole of Who and what is given: Like the moment before the cutting of the cake, when all the candles are burning and we see and appreciate, before we taste, all the goodness of the Lord. A moment of appreciation and anticipation of all that has been done and all that is to come. This is the unique and beautiful moment that Corpus Christi captures and celebrates.
