Prophet, Priest and King

Did you know that you're a prophet? That you have a prophet's gifts? Perhaps you didn't realise? Well, every week - at least once - and many other times I'm sure, you use your gift and act:- stand up and in front of everyone make a prophetic statement so that all can hear! Yes, every week, the words of today's first reading come true in you: "The spirit came into me and made me stand up . I heard the Lord speaking.. The Lord says this"

Each week, after the Lord speaks to us in the readings, we stand and say: "I believe!" That's a profoundly prophetic statement, these days, isn't it? To say in our mess of a world, amid a tide of unbelief, "I believe in one God." It's not a welcome statement, the one we make, but a prophet's never welcome. You need a gift to say it. The gift of prophesy we got at baptism.

My Dad had a really annoying habit - at least I found it annoying even if he used to think it fun. Whenever he got a present he wouldn't open it. He'd take his time and play this game of trying to guess what he'd received by feeling through the paper, weighing up the parcel, shaking, or even smelling the packet. And if he thought it was socks again or something else he didn't really want, he had the terrible habit of leaving his gift on one side, unopened. Not very nice for whoever had made the present!

I wonder if we're a bit like that with the gifts that we received at baptism. We got three royal gifts on that day - but many of us have left them unwrapped and hardly used. We sort of guessed - like my Dad did that this isn't really something that I fancy and so left them on one side. Or maybe it's that we use our gifts all the time but have just never named them?

You see, at Baptism, when the water was poured over us and we were anointed in God's name, we were given three things by God:- a gift from our Father to govern and bring the world under God's power, a gift from the Lord Jesus to prophesy and teach others of the goodness of God and of God's world, and a gift from the Spirit to make things holy, to sanctify. We believe that these gifts of our baptism made of each one of us a priest, a prophet and a king: all rolled into one! Is it that we've never opened our presents or just that we've never known or named them?

I don't suppose it matters as long as we name and use them now. If, when we stand and say, "I believe," we think of the prophetic prayer we're making; that amid the world's mess we still believe in the goodness of God and that all, in the end, will be well. If we remember, in this moment, that each of us has the power not just to vote for a better country but to govern our own little constituency here: to put things right and do our bit, where we are. And that we have the gift of making holy - every hour of every day if we bless it with the presence and the power of God's Spirit through prayer. This way we make the kingdom come.
